Educational institutionalization of the Dry Valley Rehabilitation and Productive Use Approach (DVRPU)

Background

The aim of the DREAM Conferences and Pre-Conferences is to share / cooperate and coordinate in lowland development and to support the development of these special areas.

Following the Development of Resilience Empowering Alternative Measures in Arid and Semi-arid Lowlands of Ethiopia conference (DREAM- I) held in Afar, September 2019, three Pre-conferences were executed: (i) Coordination Pre-Conference held on 3rd November 2020, (ii) Co-operation Pre-Conference held on 12th November 2020 and (iii) Capacitation held on 26th November 2020. The Pre-conferences offered opportunities to develop coalitions along the topic of strengthening drought resilience and provided a platform for bringing together different stakeholders such as federal and regional government partners, national and international NGOs, research institutions and international development partners active in the lowlands of Ethiopia. There is a large interest to share experiences and approaches on topics of common interest as well to strengthen more formal cooperation through the development of a Task Force.

Learning event

It is planned that in the run-up to the large DREAM-II Conference (planned to be held in Jigjiga 20-24 September 2021), a number of learning/ sharing events will be organized on topics of common interest. DREAM learning events are meant to create connections between different organizations working in lowland development this topic, to share experience and discuss the scaling of the good practices

The second such learning event is planned on 28 April 2021. It will discuss the educational institutionalization in support of lowland development. It will present the Dry Valley Rehabilitation and Productive Use Approach, as implemented with support of GiZ-SDR and see how this can be integrated into educational programs. DVRPU approach comprises community planning, physical and biological soil and water conservation, livelihood development, rangeland development, invasive species management, water, sanitation and hygiene and disaster risk management to rehabilitate dry valleys and enhance livelihoods in the lowlands of Afar and Somali Region.

The Learning Event will discuss the educational institutionalization of DVRPU. It discusses to what extent educational programs at the level of universities and TVETs cater for the specific needs of the lowlands. It will discuss to a larger audience the DVRPU approach and will discuss what is required to institutionalize it in higher education. The audience are the different educational institutes and the different (possible) implementers of the approach in regional governments and in programs such as LLRP and PSNP.

The event will be last three hours and fifteen minutes will be both <u>virtual and with physical meetings</u> in Jigjiga and Semera. It will consist of six presentation of 10 minutes each, group discussion and

plenary discussion. The results will be placed on the DREAM website and proceedings will be produced.
