 - SSD has developed morethan 20 irrigation projects in Afar. Some of the irrigation infrastructure are damaged and needs rehabilitation. So we can jointly rehabilitate the schemes with less cost but bigger impact to transform pastoralists to Agro-pastralists collaborately.
 - With other organizations/partners:
 - SSD has the expertise in irrigation development. We are happy to share this experience to interested organizations.
 - The pastoralist/ agro-pastoralist development needs a multi-specialization engagements. So SSD wants to join hands with other partner organizations in areas of Fodder development, veterinary service, linking relief with development initiatives, and so on.

Local food production in from nil to ...





Increased milk availability

Reduced migration especially the women and children Milking cows are kept around the settlement throughout



Natural resource conservation practices started ...

 Plantation of trees like Papaya, Neem, Moringa etc. in home stead, along canals in the irrigation land, at Schools and government offices
Moisture conservation and water harvesting activities



Permanent settlement in project kebeles started...

- Very few Afar houses around the irrigation area (less than 10) in mid 2004
- More than 500 families have permanently settled around the irrigation scheme



School enrollment dramatically increase

- 250 students
- More than 8 teachers
- Up graded the school up to grade 8
- School expanded by PCDP Afar



Improved communication and transportation...

- At least one truck every day
- A small bus occasionally
- Wireless telephone service



Trading improved

Shops, local restaurant, electric generators, satellite dishes, TV, grinding mills
