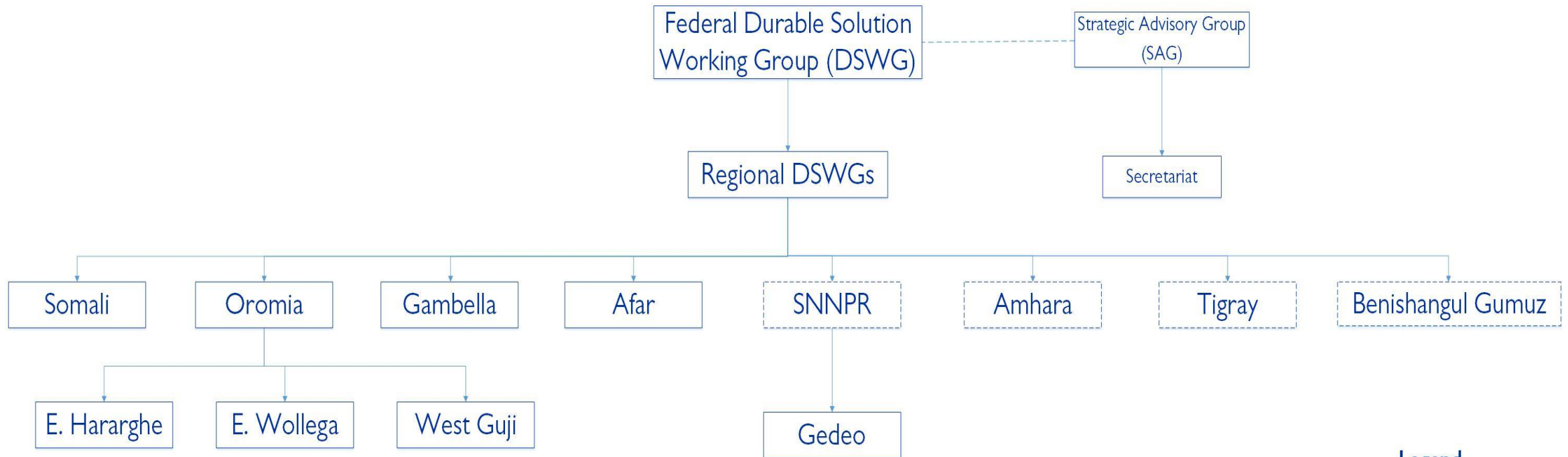



8 Criteria for achieving Durable Solutions for IDPs

In efforts to support the Somali Regional Government to advance durable solutions to protracted displacement, a holistic operational framework has been developed to inform targeted and community level interventions in locations of displacement, areas of return, relocation, and where possible local integration. The framework is built on the 2019 National Strategy to Address Displacement and framed around the key pillars of the Ethiopia Durable Solutions Initiative (DSI) strategy to encompass operational, policy, and institutional interventions to sustain solutions in accordance to the IASC framework on Durable Solutions for Internally Displaced Persons. Interventions are aimed at strengthening action-oriented coordination to support displacement affected communities.

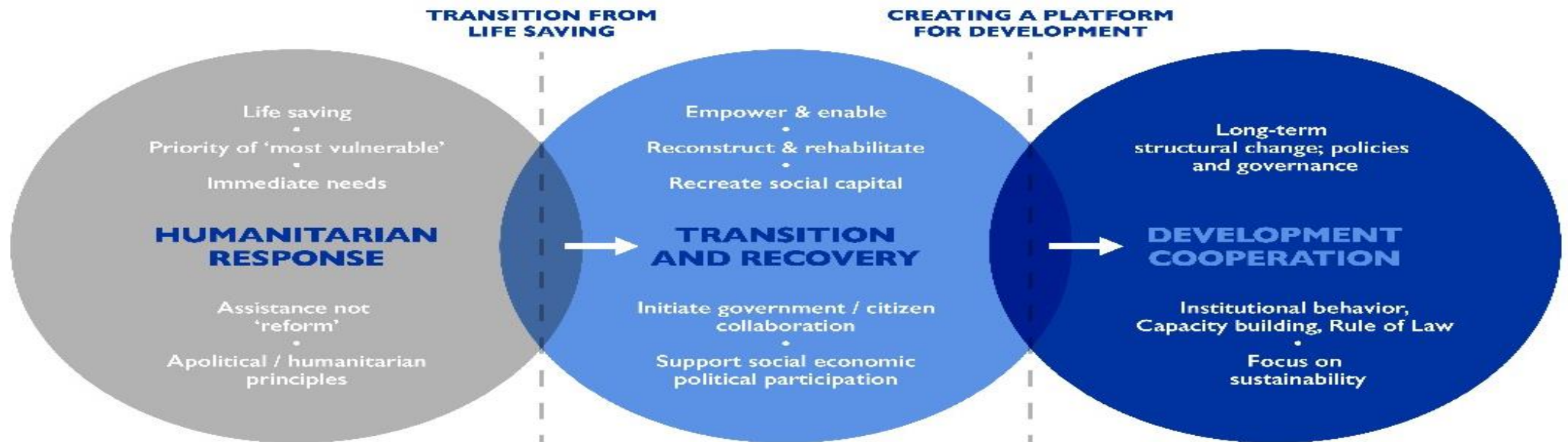
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Durable Solutions- the “missing” middle

DS interventions are positioned in the ‘missing middle’, sitting between humanitarian response and long-term development. Through nexus considerate means, efforts are aimed at building resilience to future shocks and resolving potential transition and recovery challenges that are the key to unlocking solutions.



SR. Durable Solutions Cooperation

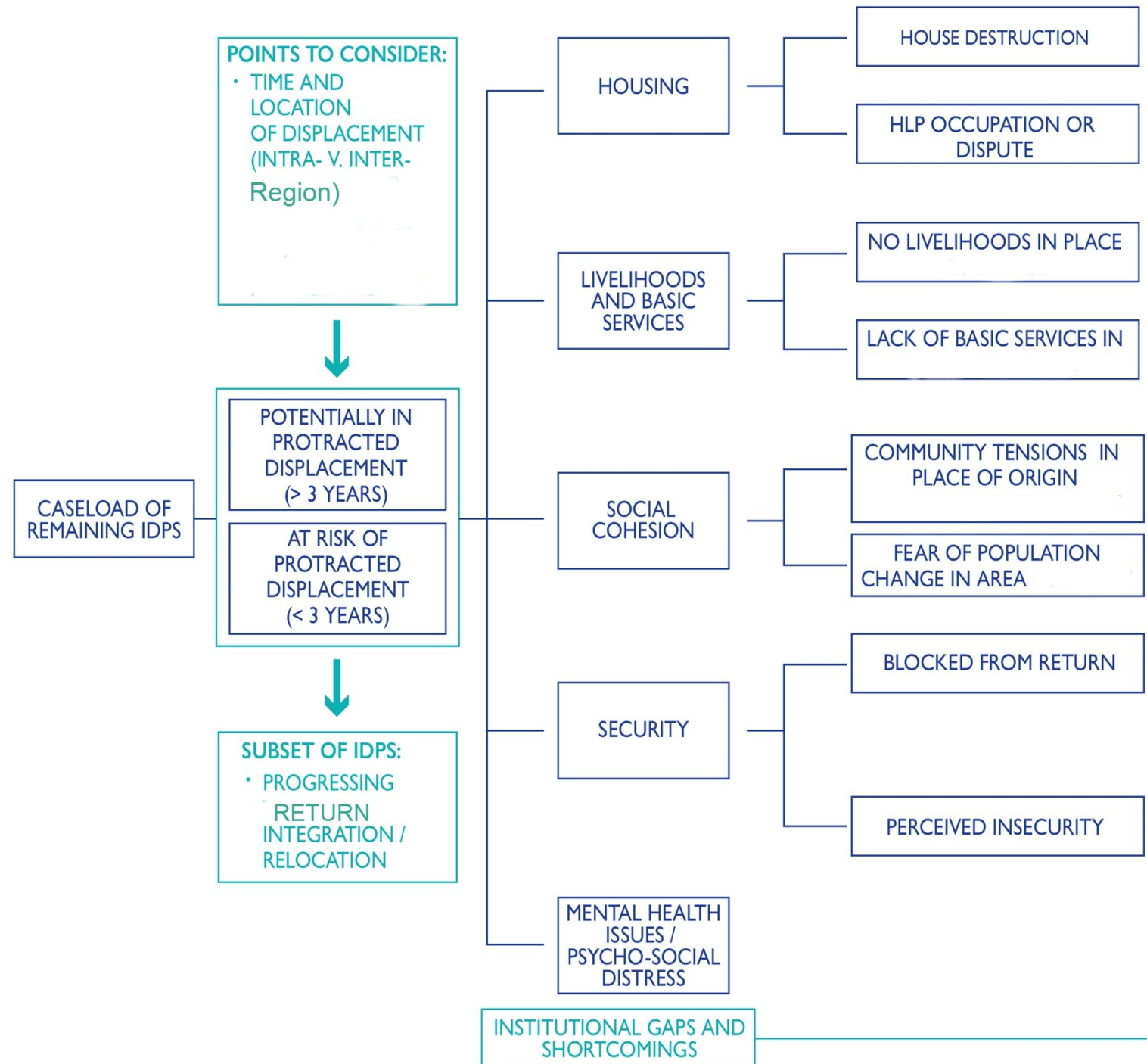
Durable Solutions operational pilots are framed around the eight criteria of the IASC Framework, yet also focus on perspective of IDPs seeking to address their displacement status as well as the willingness of host communities and leadership by local authorities. Interventions contribute to the broader discussion around solutions, underpin policy development and assist both the government and operational agencies in the development of projects and activities in support of solutions.

Facilitating Durable Solutions Operational Pilots- Activity Set

PRE-DEPARTURE

Sensitization: Information sessions and tent-by-tent dissemination of information is conducted in the camps to inform IDPs of the project.

Intention Surveys: Surveys are carried out after the sensitization campaigns to determine preferred intentions, locations of intended settlement, and key obstacles to departure from the camp.

Help desk/ registration: A registration help desk will be set up in the camp to enable households with intentions to depart to voluntarily sign up for the program.

Protection Risk & Conflict Assessments: Protection risk assessment is conducted on areas of potential settlement to assess possible risks.

Community-based Planning: Participatory planning with The Government and communities to develop community inclusive Community Action Plans for locations of settlement.

Go and See & Come and Tell Visits: Visits will be organized for local representatives from the target host communities to travel to IDP sites and provide information. IDPs may also participate in visits to locations of settlement before finalizing their intentions.

Departure Support Services: Know before you go/ mine action information session, legal/ protection assessments, health consultation, and facilitated movement.

Area of Arrival Help Desk: Arrival registration and, 'arrival cash assistance' is provided to households to help cover their immediate needs upon arrival.

Referral to specialized services: Referrals for specialized household-level services, including to MHPSS, child protection and gender-based violence case management, legal assistance and documentation replacement, housing/land/ and property (HLP), shelter, and livelihood support.

Post-settlement monitoring: Community tension monitoring and household level (re)integration monitoring is carried out

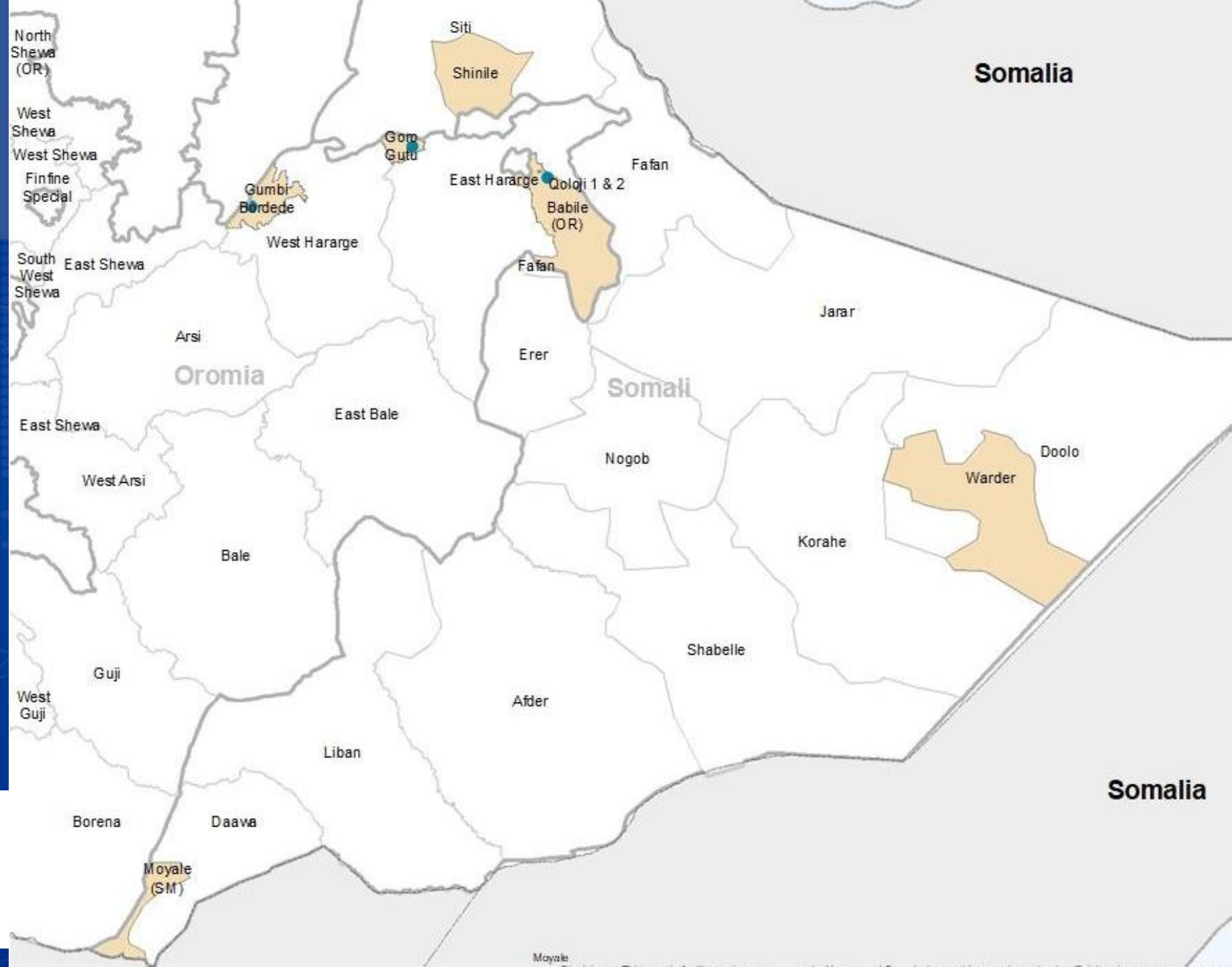

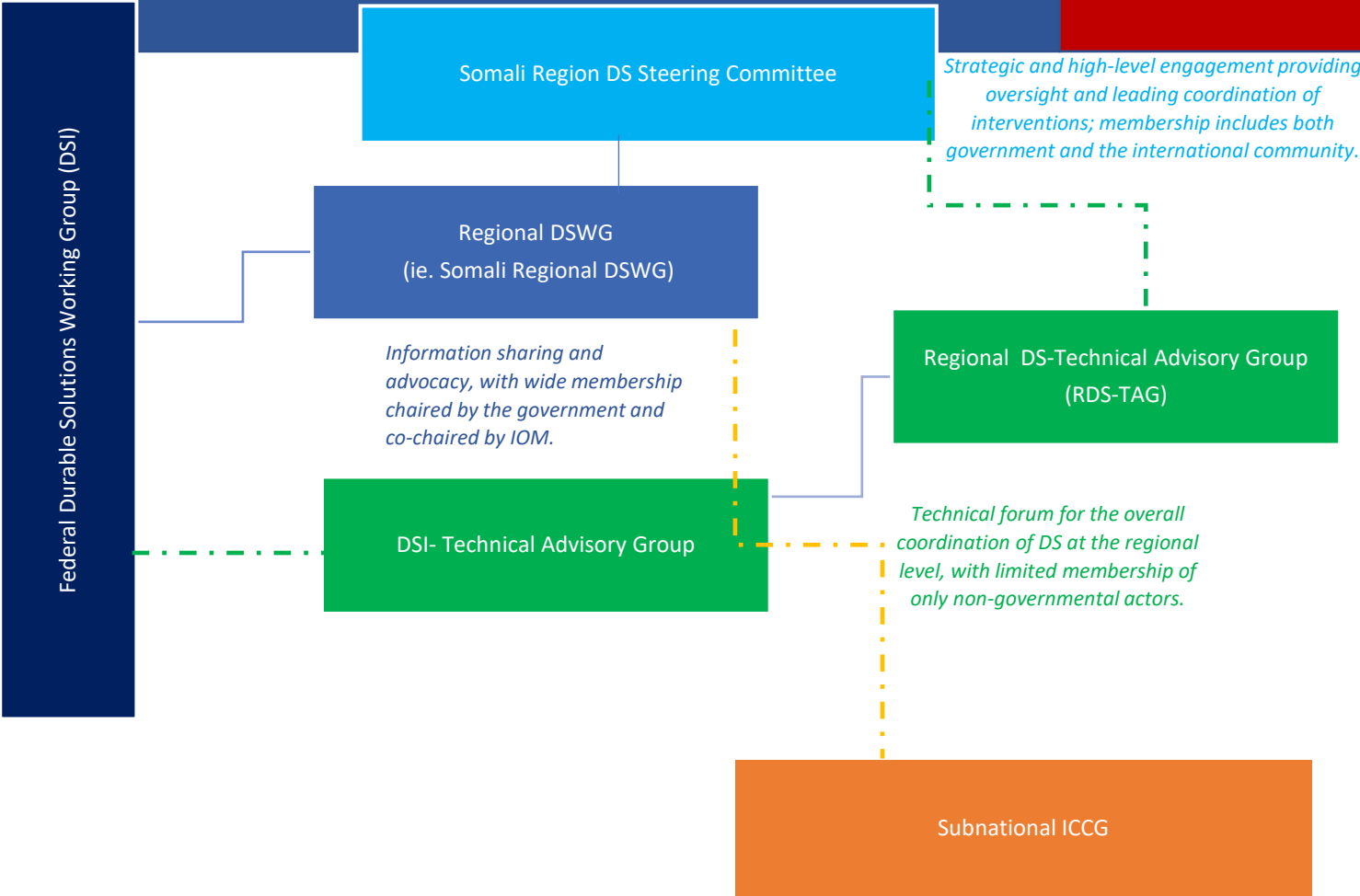
Nexus based interventions

1. Matching IASC durable solutions criteria and indicators with humanitarian interest
2. Identifying possible intervention areas to ensure transitional operations and exit strategy from humanitarian

Area-based Interventions	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Ensure nexus based interventions that particularly ensure solutions from the onset and the centrality of protection.• Transitional assistance- exit strategy from humanitarian to generate community resilience• Strengthening institutions and coordination bearing in mind the government is the duty bearer to solutions for IDPs.• Community resource management and innovation to respond to shocks and plan for longer term solutions.
Coordination	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Ensure linkages between clusters and development/ solutions oriented coordination mechanisms at the subnational and local levels• Joint operations that favor nexus-based approaches and integrated “graduation model” interventions impacting multiple sectors
Mainstreaming solutions	Systematic use of a resilience marker for development and humanitarian programming in protracted displacement situations

Cooperation. Durable Solutions Architecture

The DS. Steering Committee, Technical Advisory Group, and DS. Working Group form the core of the durable solutions architecture in the Somali Region. Together the three function to operationalize the regional continuum between the humanitarian (Cluster) and development (UNSDCF) coordination architectures. All three mechanisms are designed to work in concert, with the Steering Committee providing overall strategic direction and coherence at the highest level; SR-DSTAG serving as a technical forum developing and overseeing methodological roll out of operational plans; and the regional DSWG providing a broad-based platform for information sharing and dissemination.
